

he Yellowhead Highway spans through British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan, and Manitoba and offers adventure, attractions and history the whole route! Whether you're looking to get your blood pumping with thrill-seeking adventures, see some of Canada's most beautiful parks, or experience the rich history of Canada's West, there is something for everyone. Along the highway you'll find 5 national parks, 90 provincial parks, and countless Instagramworthy photo opportunities worth stopping for. It doesn't matter if you're on the highway for a short trip or if you're cruising the whole thing, our guide is here to help you on your journey!

WHY IS IT CALLED THE "YELLOWHEAD"?

The Yellowhead Highway began as the secret trail of its namesake, the blonde Iroquois Metis guide Pierre Bostonais, known as "Tête Jaune" — which literally translates as Yellow Head.

STARTING POINT

The Trans Canada Highway begins in the west at Masset, BC, on Haida Gwaii, then heads south along Graham Island to Skidegate. It then connects via a 172-km-long ferry route to Prince Rupert, then passes southeastward to Prince George and through to Tête Jaune Cache. It enters Alberta through the Rocky Mountains near Jasper, and passes through Edmonton and Saskatoon before meeting the Trans-Canada Highway 1 near Portage la Prairie. Manitoba, Officially, the eastern end of the Yellowhead Highway is at the corner of Portage Avenue and Main Street in Winnipeg.

DID YOU KNOW THERE IS A SOUTHERN ROUTE?

Near Mount Robson, the southern route follows the pass to Kamloops and on to Hope, the gateway to the Fraser Valley.

LENGTH

The total length of the Yellowhead Highway, including ferries, is 2,960 km. The southern leg in BC is 524 km for a combined total of 3,484 km!

NAIKOON PROVINCIAL PARK Northeast tip of Graham Island,

Almost 100 km of beaches, rare plants, and wildlife.

SEVEN SISTERS **PROVINCIAL PARK**

A blend of coastal, interior, and northern features with plenty of wildlife.

BABINE MOUNTAINS PROVINCIAL PARK

4 km east of Smithers

This isolated park protects sub-boreal spruce and alpine tundra.

UNCHA MOUNTAINS RED HILLS PROVINCIAL PARK

30 km south of Burns Lake

The Pony Express was located on the west end of this park that is great for backcountry camping.

FRANCOIS LAKE PROVINCIAL PARK

12 km southwest of Fraser Lake

High-quality moose habitat and abundant First Nations history.

MOUNT ROBSON PROVINCIAL PARK 90 km east of McBride

Mt. Robson is the highest peak in the Canadian Rockies.

WELLS GRAY PROVINCIAL PARK Off the Yellowhead Highway near Clearwater

Known as "Waterfall Park," Helmcken Falls is higher than Niagra Falls!

NATIONAL PARK

GWAII HAANAS NATIONAL MARINE CONSERVATION AREA RESERVE & HAIDA HERITAGE SITE

Located in Haida Gwaii (formerly Queen Charlotte Islands)

Made up of 138 islands that preserves Haida culture and incredible wildlife.

WILLIAM A. SWITZER PROVINCIAL PARK

Between Grande Cache and Hinton

Foothills region filled with thick forests and wildlife such as elk, moose, and bears.

OBED LAKE PROVINCIAL PARK 49 km west of Edson

Three small lakes and flourishing wetlands are home to the endangered Trumpeter Swans.

SUNDANCE PROVINCIAL PARK

100 km east of lasper **National Park**

Old-growth forest, hoodoos, and wetland

PEMBINA RIVER PROVINCIAL PARK

Between Entwistle and Evansburg

Take in the sandstone cliffs while on a tube ride down the river.

WABAMUN LAKE PROVINCIAL PARK

60 km west of Edmonton

Stroll around the boardwalk, bird watch, or enjoy water sports.

LOIS HOLE CENTENNIAL PROVINCIAL PARK

West of Edmonton and St. Albert

Over 220 species of birds have been recorded in the park.

VERMILION PROVINCIAL PARK 80 km west of Vermilion

Protects scenic marshes and oxbow lakes.

NATIONAL PARKS

IASPER NATIONAL PARK

Located around lasper

The largest of Canada's Rocky Mountain Parks known for its stunning glaciers.

ELK ISLAND NATIONAL PARK Near Fort Saskatchewan

Famed for its wild bison herds and is part of the Beaver Hills Dark Sky Preserve.

BRONSON FOREST PROVINCIAL PARK

90 km northeast of Llovdminster

Great fishing, beaches, and home to a hand of wild horses

THE BATTI FEORDS PROVINCIAL PARK

38 km north of North Battleford

Known for its beaches and sand dunes.

PIKE LAKE PROVINCIAL PARK 29 km southwest of Saskatoon

This park has fully furnished cabins for rent and easy access to the sand dunes.

BLACKSTRAP PROVINCIAL PARK

45 km southeast of Saskatoon

Mount Blackstrap was constructed to host the 1971 Canada Winter Games

GREAT BLUE HERON PROVINCIAL PARK

45 km north of Prince Albert

Saskatchewan's newest provincial park with great beaches and camping.

GOOD SPIRIT LAKE PROVINCIAL PARK

55 km northwest of Yorkton

Rated one of the Top Ten Beaches in Canadal

NATIONAL PARK

PRINCE ALBERT NATIONAL PARK

Near Waskesiu Lake

Contains a protected white pelican nesting colony and freeranging plains bison.

Manitoba

ASESSIPPI PROVINCIAL PARK 16 km west of Riding Mountain **National Park**

Protects mixed grass prairie, aspen, and burr oak woodlands.

BEAUDRY PROVINCIAL PARK 10 km west of Winnipeg

Protects large basswood. cottonwood, and maple trees, as well as rare tall-grass prairie.

NORRIS LAKE PROVINCIAL PARK

62 km northwest of Winnipeg

Waterskiing, swimming, and fishing for northern pike.

WINNIPEG BEACH **PROVINCIAL PARK**

50 km northeast of Winnipeg

This historic and popular resort town has a ton of amenities.

BIRDS HILL PROVINCIAL PARK 24 km north of Winnipeg

Great cycling along Pine Ridge Bike Trail and Bluestem Mountain Bike Trail

GRAND BEACH PROVINCIAL PARK 80 km northeast of Winnipeg

Lake Winnipeg is one of the largest fresh water lakes in the world

NATIONAL PARK

RIDING MOUNTAIN NATIONAL PARK

Near Wasagaming

Protects boreal forest, aspen parkland, and mixed-grass prairie.

UNESCO DESIGNATED SITES

There are 18 LINESCO designated sites in Canada. Two are on the Yellowhead Highway, and one is a UNESCO Biosphere Reserve!

SGANG GWAAY ON HAIDA GWAII

Located on a small island off the beautifully rugged, Pacific west coast of the Queen Charlotte Islands, are remains of ancient Haida villages that contain cedar long houses. and 32 carved totemic mortuary and memorial poles, that illustrate the Haida people's art and way of life.

CANADIAN ROCKY MOUNTAIN PARKS

The Canadian Rocky Mountain Parks are comprised of Banff, lasper, Kootenay and Yoho national parks and Mount Robson, Mount Assiniboine and Hamber provincial parks. They are studded with rugged mountain peaks, icefields, glaciers, alpine meadows, lakes, waterfalls, cave systems, deeply incised canyons, and the Burgess Shale fossil site.

BEAVER HILLS BIOSPHERE

Only 20 minutes east of Edmonton rests the newest UNESCO biosphere, which supports a high diversity of both boreal forest and parkland species. This distinctive landscape encompasses 1,572 sq km, with over 35 separate lakes. wetlands, and streams. Explore the area by accessing the Beaver Hills Biodiversity Trail. 4.5 km south of Hwv 16 near Strathcona County, AB.

IDENTIFYING POPULAR WILDLIFE

If there is one thing you can count on while travelling through the Prairies it's finding wildlife along the way! Here are some of the more popular wildlife you might cross paths with if you keep your eyes peeled!



GRIZZLY BEAR

Grizzlies like open areas and are usually found in the foothill. mountain and boreal areas. Their most identifying feature is their shoulder hump. They're usually active from spring until late fall and hihernate for the winter



MOOSE

Moose are found pretty much everywhere in Canada. They're the largest member of the deer family in the world, with the bulls weighing up to 1000lbs and the cows averaging 770lbs. Their colouration ranges from dark brown to black, and they are easily identified by the "bell" that hangs under their throat (which is just a loose fold of skin).

▶ Did You Know? Moose have a poor sense of sight and rely on their sense of smell and hearing to survive.



BLACK BEAR

Black Bears are considerably smaller than Grizzlies, Despite their name, black bears' colours vary from black all the way to blonde. They like forested areas and are also active from spring through to late fall.



WHITE-TAILED DEER

White-tailed deer, like moose. are found almost everywhere in Canada, Their colour changes from reddish-brown to greyishbrown as the season changes. Their most distinctive feature is there tail, which is actually brown with a white fringe. While running, the deer stick their tail straight out, showing the white underside White-tailed deer are guite jumpy and will move quickly when alarmed, which can pose a potential hazard to drivers when the deer are on the side of the road

REMEMBER: All wildlife are unpredictable and can be dangerous! Do not leave your vehicle to take photos, and do not feed the wildlife!



Elk are tan in color, except for their head, neck and legs, which are dark brown. Elk are usually found in the foothills and mountains



CARIBOU

Caribou also like forested areas. Both male and female caribou grow antlers and have a beige neck with a dark brown body, legs, and face.



PRONGHORN ANTELOPE

Pronghorns are usually tan coloured, with two white bars across the throat. The can also have white markings on their underside, lower sides and rump. Both male and females have horns.

hough it's only officially been open since 1970, when you drive along the Yellowhead Highway, you're driving along a road paved with hundreds of years of history and adventure. Your road trip follows the footsteps of fearless fur traders, Cariboo Gold Rush hopefuls, and daredevil Model T Ford drivers!

The Yellowhead's most famous traveller — and the highway's namesake — is Pierre Bostonais who was an Iroquois Métis guide in the early 1800s. He led countless fur traders through the seemingly impassable Rocky Mountains, the first being James McMillan in 1825, a chief trader with the Hudson's Bay Company. He also led the rival North West Company through his route as well. French voyageurs referred to him as Tête Jaune (which translates to Yellowhead) because of the blonde streaks in his hair and so his route became known as the Yellowhead Pass

In 1859, gold was discovered in the Horsefly River causing a flood of travellers to the area dreaming of immense and fast wealth. One group known as the Overlanders, made up of 115 men and one woman from Ontario, travelled through the Yellowhead Pass based on the advice of a party of miners they met in Fort Edmonton. Over their monthslong journey, they suffered many losses and separations, but their trip was successful and is still known as one of the most impressive journeys in Canadian travel history.

Half a century after Bostonais, the Canadian National Railway constructed a line along that same route, which they called the Yellowhead Trail. However, it wasn't until after the First World War that people began to conceive of a car-worthy road in its place. In 1921, a CNR surveyor and the president of the Edmonton Automobile Association formed a committee to lobby for the creation of the Yellowhead Highway. Both believed that the




abandoned railway bed would be the ideal foundation for the road.

As automobile popularity was rising, and travelling the Yellowhead Trail was difficult for the average car, the two decided to offer a challenge to Westerners - anyone who could traverse the entire road by car would be offered a prize similar to the one sought by Cariboo Gold Rush hopefuls: a gold medal. So on June 17, 1922, Charles Neiymer and Frank Silverthorne departed in a 4x4 and, the following week, George Gordon and J. Sims left Edmonton in a Model T Ford. Both pairs arrived in Victoria on July 4 and were awarded gold medals.

Despite the attention this event created, it still wasn't until the Second World War that the road saw much development. During the war, displaced Japanese Canadians in internment camps were forced to work on the road. Their labour built a path through Jasper and into the Fraser Valley. With all of these improvements, the road received more

federal investment and was generally re-built and paved by 1969. Earlier in 1947, the Trans Canada Yellowhead Higway Association was formed to work with the communities along the highway to help develop the safety and economies along the burgeoning route. After many voyages and ventures, the Yellowhead Highway was officially opened on August 15, 1970, by B.C. Premier W.A.C. Bennett.

Today, the Yellowhead Highway stretches 2,960 km across the four Western provinces of Canada, containing in its path five national parks, 90 provincial parks, and countless national historic sites. The road begins in downtown Winnipeg where fur traders and voyageurs met, and continues through the prairies and Rocky Mountains to the pristine islands of the Haida Gwaii on the West Coast. Some incredible adventures have been had on the legendary Yellowhead Highway - we hope Go Yellowhead helps you make yours a memorable one!





The Yellowhead Highway forks in British Columbia, giving you two scenic routes to choose from.

The northwest route starts on Haida Gwaii. which is commonly referred to as the Queen Charlotte Islands, The Gwaii Haanas National Park Reserve and Heritage Site are home to endless untouched beaches, majestic wildlife, and temperate rainforest.

The mainland route starts in Prince Rupert and continues all the way to Tête Jaune Cache. Make sure to stop in Telkwa, which borders on a provincial park, and offers hiking, canoeing, and skiing. If fishing is on your list of things to experience, Houston is home to the world's largest fly-fishing rod. The Bulkley and Morice river systems are popular fishing destinations and are home to steelhead, salmon and trout.

Once you reach Tête Jaune Cache, you can either follow the Yellowhead Highway east into Alberta, or hop onto the southern leg towards Hope. This southern section of the highway is filled with beautiful parks and trail systems to stop and enjoy along the way. Some notable stops include Wells Gray Provincial Park, which is home to hundreds of waterfalls, and George Hicks Park, which is home to the longest Chinook salmon run!



If you're looking to get away from the crowds to off-trail, fresh powder, heliskiing is for you! Enjoy a quick flight to the top of the trail, and follow your experienced guide down the mountain.







The Yellowhead Highway stretches right through Alberta, guiding you through the stunning Rocky Mountains right into the golden prairie landscape

Jasper National Park is the largest national park in the Canadian Rockies and is packed with activities to do year-round. During the warmer season, you can climb to the summit of Whistlers Mountain on the Jasper SkyTram, which overlooks downtown Jasper. There are countless trails for hiking and biking, or you can rent a kayak or canoe and paddle the open waters. The Maligne Canyon and Icefields Parkway are must-sees while you are there.

Further along the highway you'll enter the province's capital city. Edmonton is known as Festival City and hosts more than 35 festivals every year. Edmonton is also home to West Edmonton Mall, which features over 800 shops and services. Whyte Avenue is a popular destination with boutique shopping and multiple restaurants/coffee shops to keep you fueled on the way!

Just east of Edmonton is Elk Island National Park, where you can camp, hike, canoe, and keep your eyes peeled for the free-roaming bison. Continuing east you'll find the Wapasu Recreation Conservancy Park near Innisfree, which has 4km of scenic hiking trails and bird viewing. The Yellowhead Highway continues to Canada's only border city, Lloydminster.







LAKE GETAWAYS

Swimming, hiking, nature watching, canoeing, having a picnic, or just working on your tan... regardless what going to the lake means to you, here are a few lakes you can stop at on your trip!

Wabamun Lake

One of the most popular lakes in Alberta, Wabamun lies about 65 km west of Edmonton on the Yellowhead Highway.

Summer: Set out on a power boat, sailboat, or canoe and fish for the area's renowned northern pike and whitefish. Head to one of the popular swimming beaches, like Moonlight Bay or Seba Beach. Take in the surrounding nature by birdwatching, and see if you can find a hooded merganser, bald eagle, or one of the various moulting water birds.

Winter: The lake is great for ice fishing, and the area's nature trails. become excellent for cross-country skiing and snowmobiling.

Pigeon Lake

This lake is about 60 km south of Edmonton on Highway 2 and 23 km west on Highway 13.

Summer: At Ma-Me-Mo Beach, enjoy plentiful white sand and shallow waters that are especially appropriate for children. Other spots, such as Mulhurst Bay, have boat launches, and the surrounding area also includes a playground, volleyball court, and great restaurants.

Winter: Enter the annual ice golf tournament and enjoy this otherwise summery sport on the frozen lake. The area also has several groomed cross-country ski trails. Snowmobile access is available to the lake only.

Miquelon Lake


This lake is located about 65 km southeast of Edmonton (south along Highway 21 and then east along Highway 623).

Summer: Enjoy the wide, sandy beach, forested picnic spots, and non-motorized aquatic activities like kavaking and canoeing. The area also has an interconnecting trail system that is perfect for biking and hiking. Visit the Miguelon Park Centre to rent a Discovery Pack to learn more about the surrounding nature or a geocaching kit to find hidden caches.

Winter: Cross-country ski along the lake's shoreline or through the 20 km of backcountry trails. Skijoring (cross-country skiing with dogs!) is permitted along certain trails, and snowshoe rentals are available through the Park Centre during the week.

















HISTORY

ALBERTA AVIATION MUSEUM. **EDMONTON**

The Alberta Aviation Museum is located in the historic Blatchford Field and is the last remaining double-long, double-wide hangar from the World War II era. The museum houses aircraft spanning over several decades and has an extensive restoration program, which brings in new aircraft regularly.

CANADIAN NATIONAL RAILWAY STATION, VEGREVILLE

Located in downtown Vegreville, the CNR Station is a two-storey wood frame building that exemplifies the standard plan railway station architecture. It was built in 1930 and currently houses a restaurant and meeting space.







From Lloydminster to Langenburg, the Yellowhead Highway will take you through some of Saskatchewan's most beautiful scenery!

Stand in two places at once in Lloydminster, Canada's only border city. The world's largest border markers divide Alberta and Saskatchewan, so make sure to stop and take the iconic photo with a foot in each province! Further east you'll come across Battleford and North Battleford (commonly referred to as the Battlefords). Here you can stop at the King Hill Lookout, which provides a 360 degree view of the area, including the River Valley, Battleford and North Battleford. The lookout can be accessed from Territorial Drive, west of the Territorial Drive and Highway 4 intersection. Make sure to pack your walking shoes because there are lots of beautiful trails in the area!

Saskatoon is the largest city in Saskatchewan and borders the South Saskatchewan River, providing lots of opportunity for outdoor activities. It is also home to the Wanuskewin Heritage Park, which has archeological discoveries that date back over 8000 years.

Stop in Watrous/Manitou Beach to visit Canada's largest indoor mineral springs spa, Manitou Mineral Springs. Due to the high mineral concentration, the water both in the indoors springs and at Manitou Beach are said to have healing properties. Once you're all relaxed, stop by Danceland for a tour, and bust some moves on the horsehair dance floor!

Take in some history at the Saskatchewan Western Development Museum in Yorkton, which depicts early pioneer life and features a pioneer log home and an extensive outdoor display of early tractors and steam engines.



The most eastern stretch of the highway runs through Manitoba, where the Yellowhead Highway ends in Winnipeg.

The Municipality of Russell-Binscarth is the gateway to several outdoor sites, including Asessippi Ski Area & Resort, Asessippi Provincial Park, Lake of the Prairies, and Spear Lake.

Stop at Minnedosa Beach and enjoy the sandy beaches, take a swim, have a picnic, or rent a kayak and head out on the water! The beach is about 15km from downtown Minnedosa and in the winter is cleared for pond hockey and ice fishing!

If you're looking for some history, visit the Margaret Laurence Home in Neepawa. Laurence was an iconic Canadian author. You can also tour the Farmery Estate Brewery, which is one of the few breweries in the world that grows its own wheat and hops and brews it on site!

Make sure to stop at "Happy Rock" in Gladstone and get your picture taken with this iconic mascot. "Happy Rock" was featured in 2010 by Canada Post on a commemorative stamp.

The last stop of the Yellowhead Highway is Winnipeg, the capital and largest city in Manitoba. Winnipeg is home to over 25 museums, festivals, and an internally acclaimed ballet company. A must-visit while in Winnipeg is The Forks, a historic site where warehouses have been turned into shops and restaurants right on the intersection of the Assiniboine and Red rivers



Alberta is the only province in Canada with no Provincial Sales Tax (PST), However, Alberta charges a 4% Tourism Levy on hotel rooms. The Canadian Government charges a 5% Goods & Services Tax (GST) on most purchases. In Saskatchewan there is a separate 10% liquor consumption tax. The nonalcoholic portion of a restaurant meal is not taxed.

OR INFORMATION CENTRES

Most communities along the Yellowhead Highway have a visitor information centre that provides a rest stop, travel guides, and updated travel information.



EMERGENCY INFORMATION

In emergency situations, contact the local police, ambulance service, or fire department by calling 911.



TOURIST ALERT PROGRAM

The media, visitor information centres, and the Royal Canadian Mounted Police are frequently requested to communicate urgent messages to people on vacation. The Tourist Alert Program operates from June until September. If you see or hear your name contact the nearest RCMP office immediately.



EHICULAR ACCIDENT

If you are involved in an automobile accident, immediately contact the local police or RCMP.



WEATHER AND ROAD CONDITIONS

Environment Canada maintains a website that allows instant searches for current weather conditions and forecasts. It also includes weather warnings. marine weather information, and radar and satellite imaging. To check conditions and forecasts, visit weather.gc.ca For up-to-the-minute road reports, call 511.



Motorists must slow to 60 kph. or less if the posted speed is lower, when passing stopped emergency vehicles (police, ambulance, fire-fighting, public utility, or designated emergency response vehicle) or tow trucks on the same side of the highway with their flashing lights on.



DISTRACTED DRIVING LAWS

Canada has strict laws against distracted driving. Drivers can be charged with this offense and heavily fined if they operate any electronic device such as a cell phone, or are caught eating or grooming while driving. It is also an offense to drive in a way that will distract, startle, or interfere with highway users.

DOES MY PET NEED A **PFRMIT?**

Many live animals require permits. Often animals require a health inspection in the country of origin. A domestic dog or cat travelling with the owner need only meet the rabies certification reauirements.



TIPPING

The average tip in Canada is 15 percent. However, depending on the level and the nature of the service, tipping may range from 10 to more than 20 percent. Tips are generally given for good service by food and beverage servers in bars and restaurants, taxi drivers, tour guides, hotel bellhops, and estheticians. While it is not required to tip other service staff, you are certainly at liberty to do so.



RENTING A CAR

All car rental companies have a strong network of outlets across Canada. To rent a car you must be 21 years old and hold a valid driver's licence and a major credit card. (A surcharge may apply to drivers under 25 years of age.)



RENTING A MOTORHOME

Renting a motorhome is a convenient way to explore the Yellowhead Highway. You may purchase insurance at the time of rental. For lower rates, it is recommended that bookings be made three to four months in advance



IONAL PARK ENTRY

Permits are required for entry into any national park in Canada. You can purchase a day pass at a park gate, but if you intend to spend some time exploring the vast network of parks, national historic sites and marine conservation areas consider buying an annual National Parks of Canada pass. The pass is valid for one year from the date of nurchase. Also included with the annual pass is a booklet of discount coupons.
