



J Bllowhead Highway Travel Guide

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



WHY IS IT CALLED THE "YELLOWHEAD"?

The Yellowhead Highway began as the secret trail of its namesake, the blonde Iroquois Métis guide Pierre Bostonais, known as "Tête Jaune" — which literally translates to "Yellow Head."

STARTING POINT

The Trans-Canada Highway 16 begins in the west at Masset, BC, on Haida Gwaii, and heads south along Graham Island to Skidegate. It then connects via a 172 km-long ferry route to Prince Rupert and passes southeastward to Prince George and through to Tête Jaune Cache. It then enters Alberta through the Rocky Mountains near Jasper and passes through Edmonton and Saskatoon before meeting the Trans-Canada Highway 1 near Portage la Prairie. Manitoba. Officially, the eastern end of the Yellowhead Highway is at the corner of Portage Avenue and Main Street in Winnipeg.

DID YOU KNOW THERE IS A SOUTHERN ROUTE?

Near Mount Robson, the southern route follows the pass to Kamloops and on to Hope, the gateway to the Fraser Valley.

LENGTH

The total length of the Yellowhead Highway, including ferries, is 2,960 km. The southern leg in BC is 524 km, for a combined total of 3,484 km!

Attractions



Peer at some bison

Minnedosa, MB

Just a short jaunt off the highway on Highway 262 is the Bison Park. You can get out, stretch your legs, and walk through the trails viewing bison in a fenced compound. If you're there in the spring, keep your eyes peeled for newborn bison calves!

Hear Alberta's story

Edmonton, AB

The new Royal Alberta Museum opened in 2018, and it is a must-see! The museum is the largest museum in Western Canada, with over 419,000 square feet of space. There are 13 curatorial programs, highlighting everything from Alberta's history to Indigenous studies and geology.





Get your adrenaline pumping

North Battleford, SK

Adrenaline junkies, unite! The Blue Mountain Adventure Park offers zip-lining, wall climbing, paintball, an aerial course. archery, an obstacle course, an air rifle range, and more! If you're feeling a little less adventurous, there are also canoe, kayak, and naddlehoard rentals. When the snow flies, there is still lots to do: skiing, skating, and tubing!

Hinton, AB



If you're not up for a tour, you can explore the historic site yourself!





Float your worries away in healing waters

Watrous/Manitou. SK

Known as the Dead Sea of Canada, the Little Manitou Lake has such a high mineral density that it is (allegedly) impossible to sink. The water is said to have healing properties and can be accessed year-round at the

Manitou Springs Resort and Mineral Spa.



Prince George, BC

In the summer you can take a free wine tour at the Northern Lights Estate Winery, learning about the process right from the orchard to the cellar and tank room, and then tasting the finished product. You can also pick up some gifts on the way out at the Wine Shop and Tasting Bar.

Go where art & history collide

Nestled in a historic building, the Allen Sapp Gallery features the artwork of its namesake, Allen Sapp, who was a Canadian Cree painter. Sapp spent his life in North Battleford, where he told his story through his artwork. The exhibitions change periodically, featuring work from other artists.

Be a part of history

Winnipeg, MB

The Canadian Museum for Human

Rights is the only museum solely dedicated to human rights. Covering a multitude of human rights issues, the museum has exhibits that encourage conversation and thought about issues that affect everyone.





Peer through the glass floor

Jasper National Park, AB

The Glacier Skywalk is a cliffedge walkway that overlooks the Sunwapta Valley in the Columbia Icefields. The 1-km walkway is filled with history, storytelling, and some of the most spectacular views in the Rockies.



Stop for a picnic

Vegreville, AB

A one of a kind in Canada, stop at the Our Lady of the Highway monument and have a picnic. This seven-foot-tall monument was sculpted in Italy from Italian white marble and is located east of Vegreville on Highway 16A.

Pay your respects

Located next to City Hall, the RCMP Hope Monument was conceptualized by Glenn Wood, a retired RCMP member. Inscribed in the base are the words "Family, Community, Respect, Freedom" and there are plenty of benches and garden areas surrounding the monument to sit on and reflect.

AWALK In the Park

There is no shortage of recreational areas or provincial and national parks along the Yellowhead Highway. Whether you are looking for waterfalls, mountains, flora, fauna, rivers, or wide-open ranges, the parks along the highway offer it all! While recreation areas and provincial parks are normally free to enter, there is a fee to enter national parks. Please also remember that the parks are natural spaces, so make sure to be aware of wildlife and to clean up after yourself.

ANCIENT FOREST/ CHUN T'OH WHUDUIUT PROVINCIAL PARK AND PROTECTED AREA

McBride

The newest addition to the list of parks in British Columbia, the Ancient Forest is tucked away in the traditional territory of the Lheidli T'enneh and protects a portion of the only inland temperate rainforest in the world. Worth a stop all of its own is the Ancient Forest Trail, on which you will see thousand-year-old Western Redcedars and a wide variety of plants, mosses, lichens, and fungi. The park has accessibility for everyone with a 450-metre-long universal access boardwalk. There is another 2.3 km of boardwalk. that provides access to "Big" Tree, Tree Beard, Radies Tree, and a cascading waterfall that you won't want to miss!

Jasper National Park has an intricate trail system throughout the park and several "must-stop" areas, including the Athabasca Falls, Mount Edith Cavell, and the Maligne Canyon.

RIDING MOUNTAIN NATIONAL PARK

Near Wasagaming

You will find prairie grasslands, boreal forest, and sandy beaches in the 3000 km² of land within this national park. There are over 400 km of trails to explore, where you might see bison and elk roaming around, as well as a wide variety of birds soaring overhead. Visit the historic East Gate to hear the stories of the Cree and Assiniboine First Nations who called this land home thousands of years ago. This campsite is also a Parks Canada oTENTik site, where you can rent an A-frame cabin so that you can be in nature without being in nature.

PAVED WITH HISTORY

Experience the history of the west while exploring the Yellowhead Highway

hough it's only officially been open since 1970, when you drive along the Yellowhead Highway, you're driving along a road paved with hundreds of years of history and adventure. Your road trip follows the footsteps of fearless fur traders, Cariboo Gold Rush hopefuls, and daredevil Model T Ford drivers!

The Yellowhead's most famous traveller — and the highway's namesake — is Pierre Bostonais who was an Iroquois Métis guide in the early 1800s. He led countless fur traders through the seemingly impassable Rocky Mountains, the first being James McMillan in 1825, a chief trader with the Hudson's Bay Company. He also led the rival North West Company through his route as well. French voyageurs referred to him as Tête Jaune (which translates to Yellowhead) because of the blonde streaks in his hair — and so his route became known as the Yellowhead Pass.

In 1859, gold was discovered in the Horsefly River causing a flood of travellers to the area dreaming of immense and fast wealth. One group known as the Overlanders, made up of 115 men and one woman from Ontario, travelled through the Yellowhead Pass based on the advice of a party of miners they met in Fort Edmonton. Over their monthslong journey, they suffered many losses and separations, but their trip was successful and is still known as one of the most impressive journeys in Canadian travel history.




Half a century after Bostonais, the Canadian National Railway constructed a line along that same route, which they called the Yellowhead Trail. However, it wasn't until after the First World War that people began to conceive of a car-worthy road in its place. In 1921, a CNR surveyor and the president of the Edmonton Automobile Association formed a committee to lobby for the creation of the Yellowhead Highway. Both believed that the abandoned railway bed would be the ideal foundation for the road.

As automobile popularity was rising, and travelling the Yellowhead Trail was difficult for the average car, the two decided to offer a challenge to Westerners — anyone who could traverse the entire road by car would be offered a prize similar to the one sought by Cariboo Gold Rush hopefuls: a gold medal. So on June 17, 1922, Charles Neivmer and Frank Silverthorne departed in a 4x4 and, the following week, George Gordon and J. Sims left Edmonton in a Model T Ford. Both pairs arrived in Victoria on July 4 and were awarded gold medals.

Despite the attention this event created, it still wasn't until the Second World War that the road saw much development. During

the war, displaced Japanese Canadians in internment camps were forced to work on the road. Their labour built a path through Jasper and into the Fraser Valley. With all of these improvements, the road received more federal investment and was generally re-built and paved by 1969. Earlier in 1947, the Trans Canada Yellowhead Higway Association was formed to work with the communities along the highway to help develop the safety and economies along the burgeoning route. After many voyages and ventures, the Yellowhead Highway was officially opened on August 15, 1970, by B.C. Premier W.A.C. Bennett.

Today, the Yellowhead Highway stretches 2,960 km across the four Western provinces of Canada, containing in its path five national parks, 90 provincial parks, and countless national historic sites. The road begins in downtown Winnipeg where fur traders and voyageurs met, and continues through the prairies and Rocky Mountains to the pristine islands of the Haida Gwaii on the West Coast. Some incredible adventures have been had on the legendary Yellowhead Highway - we hope Go Yellowhead helps you make yours a memorable one!






Choose between two scenic routes to take you across British Columbia, and discover unique culture and gorgeous mountain views.

The northwest route begins off the provincial coast on Haida Gwaii, commonly known as the Queen Charlotte Islands. Discover endless untouched beaches, majestic wildlife, and temperate rainforest at the Gwaii Haanas National Park Reserve and Heritage Site.

On the mainland, the route starts in Prince Rupert—home to one of the largest and deepest ice-free seaports on the north coast and continues all the way to the fork at Tête Jaune Cache. For hiking, canoeing, and skiing, stop in Telkwa, which borders on a provincial park. Popular fishing destinations home to steelhead, salmon, and trout include the Bulkley and Morice river systems. Make sure to stop in Houston for a selfie with the world's largest fly-fishing rod!

At Tête Jaune Cache, continue east into Alberta (Highway 16) or hop onto the southern leg towards Hope (Highway 5), where you can take a tram over the famous Hell's Gate gorge. The southern route is filled with beautiful parks and trail systems to stop and enjoy along the way, including the incredible volcanic cliffs in Monck Provincial Park. Some notable stops include George Hicks Park (home to the world's longest Chinook salmon run), Wells Gray Park (home to hundreds of waterfalls), and Lac du Bois Grasslands (one of the largest grassland parks in Canada).

If You're Driving: British Columbia has a Distracted Driving Law in effect, which includes cell phones, GPS's, and anything else that distracts you from the road. The fine for the first ticket is \$368 and 4 demerit points. If you come across any vehicles stopped on the side of the road that have flashing red, blue, or yellow lights, it is the law to slow down to 70km/hr when in an 80km/h or over zone or 40km/h when in an under 80km/h zone and move over a lane, if possible. The cost of not slowing down or moving over is \$173 plus 3 demerit points.







COMMUNITIES

HAIDA GWAII

Haida Gwaii is an archipelago of 150 small islands and is an area rich in culture, history, and some of the most spectacular views you can imagine. Right off the Pacific Ocean, there are plenty of beautiful beaches to relax on, breathtaking rainforests to wander through, and over 500 archaeological sites to explore. The Gwaii Haanas National Park is accessible only by boat or seaplane and has no roads in it—only lush rainforest and plenty of cultural history.

PRINCE RUPERT

Prince Rupert is a port city located on Kaien Island and is a haven for people looking to spend time on the water or around wildlife. There are plenty of boat tours, or you can rent a kayak and go exploring on your own. If you prefer to stay on land, there are tons of areas to

go hiking in, or you can explore the city. Make sure to visit Cow Bay and explore the shops there; and keep your eyes peeled for all the murals and totem poles dispersed throughout this beautiful city!

DISTRICT OF STEWART

Just north of the Yellowhead Highway is the District of Stewart. Stewart is a border town, with Alaska's Misty Fiords National Park to the west and the beautiful British Columbia landscape to the east. Make sure to stop and canoe on Strohm Lake to Bear Glacier-it's an experience you won't soon forget!

BURNS LAKE

With more than 20 lakes in the area, there are plenty of places to stop and spend some time in Burns Lake. The Boer Mountain Recreation Area is just minutes from downtown and

has everything from downhill and cross-country mountain bike trails to hiking trails and free campgrounds. Burns Lake is known for its coffee shops, so be sure to stop by Alternative Grounds Coffee and Tea House or Boer Mountain Coffee House to experience one of their delicious brews!

MCBRIDE

McBride is a haven for outdoor enthusiasts year-round. In the summer there is no shortage of hiking, and the Ancient Forest, Avalanche Valley, and Kristi Glacier are just a few of the noteworthy trails. Whitewater rafting, canoeing, kayaking, and fishing are also options on many of the rivers/lakes in the area. When there is snow on the ground, cross-country skiing, backcountry ski-touring, dogsledding, and heliskiing are just a few of the activities



waiting to get you outside and active. The Valley Museum and Archives offers Daily Historical Walking Tours of McBride and Traditional Skills Workshops throughout the summer.

PRINCE GEORGE

Located in the heart of Northern BC, Prince George offers the best of both the city vibe and the outdoors experience. On vour way in (or out) of town, stop and visit Mr. PG. a 37.7-foot-tall mascot, located at the junction of Highways 16 and 97. Take a stroll on the Centennial Trail, which is 30 km of groomed walking trails throughout the city. Prince George is also home to one of three drive-in theatres left in BC. If vou're there on a clear Friday night, make sure to stop at the Astronomical Society's Observatory to watch the Northern Lights. It is open Friday nights from mid-August until the end of November and again from the beginning of February to the end of April. Admission is by donation. Head to downtown Prince George to do

some shopping, and check out its vibrant nightlife.

VALEMOUNT

Whether you're looking for unique shops and boutiques, a warm meal, a cold drink, or just stopping for the spectacular Robson Valley view. Valemount will greet you with open arms. At the Trading Post you will find local arts and crafts that you can take back home with you. There is no shortage of outdoor activities either, including golf, horseback riding, ATVing, and rafting. Valemount is a popular destination in the winter for snowmobiling and dogsledding. Mount Robson Provincial Park. a UNESCO World Heritage Site, is a must-stop as you're travelling through the area!

KAMLOOPS

A vibrant city bustling with arts and culture. Kamloops has a lot to offer, whether you're there for a short stay or a long visit. Check out one of the walking tours public art, downtown heritage, or

alley art mural. Visit the boutique shops in the downtown core. and stop for a drink at one of the breweries. There are hiking trails for every level, accessible by foot or bike in the summer and by snowshoes or cross-country skis in the winter, Kamloops is famous for its Rainbow Trout, so stop by Edith Lake or Jacko Lake and drop a line. Didn't pack your fishing rod? No worries-visit the Kamloops Visitor Centre and borrow spinning rods with reels and a basic box of tackle for free!

MERRITT

Known as the Country Music Capital of Canada, Merritt is a must-stop for country music fans! Get your history fix at the Nicola Ranch, where the first local post office and government buildings still stand. Country music fans can visit the Canadian Country Music Hall of Fame and then stop by the Baillie House and grab a brochure with a map of the country legend murals located throughout Merritt.

MUSEUM OF NORTHERN BC Prince Rupert

The Museum of Northern BC overlooks Prince Rupert Harbour and honours the culture and history of Northern British Columbia.

THE KAMLOOPA POWWOW

Kamloops

Held annually on the August long weekend, the Kamloopa Powwow is one of the largest Indigenous Culture gatherings in Western Canada. The Powwow celebrates the Secwepemc people, with over a thousand dancers telling their story through storytelling, song, and dance.

SECWEPEMC HERITAGE PARK

Kamloops

Wander the trails of the ethnobotanical gardens, which grow indigenous plants that are used by the Secwepemc. This park is over 4-hectares large and has replicas of winter homes and a summer tulle mat lodge.




This lodge was used for years as a seasonal bear-hunting lodge until recreational bear hunting was banned on the Islands. It was then turned into a holiday destination, specializing in authentic Haida experiences and all-inclusive tours

Visit the largest national park in the Canadian Rockies, Jasper National Park, and enjoy everything from skiing and snowshoeing to mountain biking and whitewater rafting. During the warmer season, get an overview of downtown Jasper when you climb to the summit of Whistlers Mountain on the Jasper SkyTram. Hike and bike along the countless trails, or rent a kayak or canoe and paddle the open waters. Plus, enjoy wonders like the Maligne Canyon and Icefields Parkway.

Edmonton, the provincial capital, is Canada's Festival City—the host of more than 35 festivals throughout the year (including the second-largest Fringe festival in the world). Find world-class attractions and destination shopping at West Edmonton Mall, and make sure to check out the restaurants, coffee shops, events, and boutiques along Whyte Avenue.

COMMUNITIES

IASPER

Part of the Jasper National Park, lasper is a quiet mountain town that offers plenty to do vear-round. Get outside and get active, or take a casual stroll through the downtown, lasper is home to the world's largest dark-sky preserve, so visit the Planetarium, learn about the skies, and then head outside to stargaze with knowledgeable astronomy staff. Jasper is also known for Marmot Basin. where you can explore 91 ski/ snowhoard runs

HINTON

Located just 20 km outside of lasper National Park, Hinton has no shortage of scenic areas to stop at and enjoy. You could see heavers in their natural habitat at the Beaver Boardwalk or stop by the Northern Rockies Museum. Just outside of Hinton is the Folding Mountain Brewing Taproom and Restaurant, where vou can taste some local brews while taking in the stunning mountain landscape!

EDSON

Rich in history. Edson is home to the Coal Branch Railway, which was one of the first railways in Western Canada, Learn about this and more at the Galloway Station Museum, which has a full-sized trapper's cabin and

an old station building, which is more than 100 years old. Stop by Sundance Provincial Park and wander among the hoodoos, and if it's a hot day, be sure to cool off at the Kinsmen Spray Park—a perfect stop if vou're travelling with children!

SPRUCE GROVE

lust outside of Edmonton is the community of Spruce Grove. Stop by and visit their Grain Elevator Museum, or check out a show at the Horizon Stage. If you're travelling with kids, make sure to stop at the Rotary Playscape, a playground designed by kids that is open 365 days a year!







ST. ALBERT

Located just outside of Edmonton, St. Albert is home to the largest outdoor farmers' market in Western Canada. Open Saturdays from 10 am–3 pm beginning the second Saturday in June and ending the last Saturday before Thanksgiving, the market has over 270 vendors who uphold the "make it, bake it, grow it" regulation. The Grain Elevator Park is another noteworthy stop, where you can take a guided tour of two grain elevators and visit a 1920s replica train station.









EDMONTON

Stop by Alberta's capital city and visit the largest shopping mall in North America! Edmonton is also known as Festival City and hosts a variety of festivals throughout the city, year-round. The Edmonton International Fringe Festival runs from August 15-25, 2019 and is the largest and longestrunning Fringe Festival in North America! Edmonton is also home to the largest urban park in Canada, with over 160 km of maintained pathways and parks in the River Valley.

MUNDARE

East of Edmonton is the town of Mundare-home of the world's largest sausage replica, which was built by the Stawnichy family in recognition of their 50th anniversary in Mundare. The Stawnichys are world-famous for their Ukrainian sausage, which you can buy at their store. Mundare is also home to the Basilian Fathers Museum, which features the history of the Ukrainian settlement and the Basilian Fathers Mission in Canada.

VEGREVILLE

Just a bit further east from Mundare is Vegreville, where you will find the world's largest Pysanka (Easter egg). In the park, you will also find a plaque that commemorates when Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh, visited. Vegreville has 112 parks, 77 playgrounds, and 1370 acres of designated parkland, making it the perfect destination to stop and play.



VERMILION


Nestled on the west end of the Town of Vermilion is Vermilion Provincial Park, which runs more than 9 km along the shore of the Vermilion River Valley and boasts 23 km of hiking trails. There are more than 100 species of birds in the park, and a man-made lake to kayak, canoe, or fish in. LLOYDMINSTER







Saskatoon is the largest city in

a superb symphony orchestra. It is also home
to the Wanuskewin Heritage Park, which has
archaeological discoveries that date back more
than 8000 years.

Spend a luxurious day in Watrous by visiting Canada's largest indoor mineral springs spa, Manitou Mineral Springs. Due to the high mineral concentration, the water in the indoors springs and at Manitou Beach keeps swimmers afloat on its own and is even said to have healing properties. Once you're all relaxed, stop by Danceland for a tour and bust some moves on the horsehair dance floor!

Take in some history at the Saskatchewan Western Development Museum in Yorkton. You'll find a pioneer log home and extensive outdoor displays of early tractors and steam engines and discover more about early pioneer life.

THE BATTLEFORDS

The Battlefords consists of North Battleford and the Town of Battleford, separated by the North Saskatchewan River North Battleford is the seventh largest City in Saskatchewan and is home to one of the four Saskatchewan Western Development Museum locations. focusing on the agricultural history of Saskatchewan. On the North Saskatchewan River between North Battleford and Battleford is Finlayson Island, a 4 km island full of hiking and crosscountry skiing trails, as well as a picnic area.

The Village of Borden is most popular for the Borden Bridge, a concrete bowstring-arch bridge that was constructed in 1937 as a make-work project during the Depression, Borden is also the homestead of the Diefenbaker family (John Diefenbaker was the 13th prime minister of Canada), and there is a replica of their homestead at the Borden Museum located on Main Street


SASKATOON

Saskatchewan's capital. Saskatoon, has something for everyone. Explore the river valley. or visit the Athahasca Sand

Dunes, which are reportedly one of the furthest north active sand dune formations on Earth Afterwards, head downtown and check out the shops, grab a bite to eat, and take in the Saskatoon nightlife!

COLONSAY

Named after the Inner Hebrides Scottish island of Colonsav. this village pays homage to its Scottish roots by having named all the streets after islands along the west coast of Scotland. Stop for a round of golf at their 9-hole golf course, or stay overnight at the Painted Rock Campground, which is surrounded by a working farm.

WATROUS/MANITOU

Located just off the Yellowhead is Watrous/Manitou, most famous for the Manitou Beach. which is one of only three bodies of water on the entire planet that is so rich in mineral content that it is known to offer therapeutic healing properties to both the skin and body, and is supposedly impossible to sink in! This area is also known for being home to Danceland, where you can catch live music and dance on their unique horsehair floor.

WYNYARD

The Town of Wynyard is located on a major migratory bird path and has become known as the place to go for bird-watchers.

Quill Lakes International Bird Area is about 40 km north of Wynyard and is home to Canada's largest saline lake. Over one million birds pass through this area, including the Piping Plover, an endangered species that uses the Quill Lakes as one of their two nesting grounds in Saskatchewan.

YORKTON

Saskatchewan is home to four Western Development Museum locations, one being in Yorkton, Each location focuses on different areas of Saskatchewan's vibrant history, so be prepared for a different experience each time! The Painted Hand Casino is Yorkton's Number 1

entertainment destination and hosts a wide variety of entertainment, in addition to their slot and table games.

CHURCHBRIDGE


Churchbridge is home to many lakes and rivers that are great for fishing, canoeing, or paddleboarding on! Most famously, Churchbridge is known as the birthplace of the loonie. A coin monument was erected there in recognition of the 125th anniversary of the Canadian Confederation. 

Wanuskewin Heritage Park is a National Heritage Site that is home to more than 6000 vears of Northern Plains Indigenous history. Experience the culture firsthand through this interpretive experience.





The landscape of Manitoba flows seamlessly from waves of cropland and provincial parks to thriving cities and towns with incredible museums and festivals.

The western municipality of Russell-Binscarth is the gateway to several outdoor sites, including Asessippi Ski Area & Resort, Asessippi Provincial Park, Lake of the Prairies, and Spear Lake.

About 15 km from downtown Minnedosa is Minnedosa Beach, where you can enjoy sandy beaches, take a swim, have a picnic, or rent a kayak and head out on the water—unless it's winter, in which case it's cleared for pond hockey and ice fishing!

Find literary history in Neepawa, where you can visit a living memorial to iconic Canadian author Margaret Laurence. You can also tour the Farmery Estate Brewery, which is one of the few breweries in the world that grows its own wheat and hops and brews it on site.

Make sure to stop in Gladstone to get your picture taken with "Happy Rock." This iconic mascot was featured in 2010 by Canada Post on a commemorative stamp!

The eastern "Mile 0" of the Yellowhead Highway is the capital city of Winnipeg. The city boasts museums, festivals, and some of the finest cultural and performing arts groups in Canada, including an internationally acclaimed ballet company. A must-visit is The Forks, a historic site where warehouses have been turned into shops and restaurants right on the intersection of the Assiniboine and Red rivers.

If You're Driving: Distracted Driving is illegal in Manitoba, including using or looking at an electronic device. The penalty is a driver's license suspension, \$672 fine, and 5 demerit points. When coming up to an emergency vehicle with its lights flashing, it is mandatory to slow down and move over. If the posted speed is less than 80km/hr, the maximum speed allowed while passing is 40km/ hr. If the posted speed limit is 80km/hr or higher, the maximum speed allowed while passing is 60km/hr. The minimum charge for not complying is \$300 and 2 demerit points. Speeding in a construction zone causes speed fines to double.

lust north of Russell is the Asessippi Ski Area & Resort. which boasts 25 downhill runs. 3 chair lifts, 2 terrain parks, a downhill snow-tubing park, and a village building with amenities to warm up in! Russell also has an outdoor heated swimming pool, a 9-hole golf course, and if history is more your thing, a self-guided historic walking tour!

SHOAL LAKE

In 1875, the Royal Canadian Mounted Police established a barracks that resulted in Shoal Lake being settled. There is now a replica of the log barracks that has been turned into the Shoal Lake Mounted Police Museum, which is open for visitors to explore.

MINNEDOSA

Referred to as "Manitoba's Valley Paradise." Minnedosa is home

to the longest fish ladder in Manitoba (over 600 feet). This allows fish, such as walleve. northern pike, and white sucker. to travel from Little Sakatchewan River into Minnedosa Lake and bevond. Minnedosa is also home to the Ishii Japanese Garden. which recognizes Minnedosa's sister city in Japan, Ishii.

NEEPAWA

Neenawa was home to one of Canada's most influential writers.

In July, you can marvel at more than 1500 varieties in peak bloom!

GLADSTONE

If you're going through Gladstone, a muststop is "Happy Rock," the community's monument, which is a symbol of Gladstone. The monument also serves as the Visitor Information Centre, so while you're stopping to get your photo taken in front of it, be sure



to check out what's happening in the area

PORTAGE LA PRAIRIE

Portage la Prairie offers a little bit of everything, from shopping to beaches to museums. The Island. a recreation area created by an oxbow lake that was once part of the Assiniboine River, is a mustsee. There are tennis courts, a disc golf course, a playground. and plenty of picnic areas! Portage La Prairie is also home to a variety of murals and public art, so be sure to keep your eyes peeled while out and about.


WINNIPEG

LOUIS RIEL'S TOMB Winnipeg

This historic site marks the resting place of Louis Riel, leader of the Métis during the Red River Rebellion of 1869. He played a critical role in the founding of the province of Manitoba and in protecting the Métis land rights and the rights of the French to their language.

TEEKCA'S ABORIGINAL BOUTIQUE Winnipeg

In the Forks Market you will find Teekca's Aboriginal Boutique, where you can shop for original art, authentic crafts, and jewellery from more than 300 Indigenous artists from across North America, You

can also order custom-designed mukluks and jackets, or take part in a workshop to learn traditional skills such as moccasin-making or soapstone carving.

BROKENHEAD WETLAND INTERPRETIVE TRAIL

80 km north of Winnipeg

This sacred wetland has been used by the local Oiibway for over 300 vears for both sacred ceremonies as well as for edible/medicinal plants. The trail is wheelchair accessible and has interpretive signs along the path. There are washrooms and picnic tables at the trailhead, but if vou're travelling with a pet, dogs are not allowed on the trail.

While the Canadian Museum for Human Rights covers many Indigenous issues and explores the history, the Mikinak-Keya Spirit Tour shows an Indigenous perspective on rights and responsibilities. The tour is inspired by ceremony and traditions and focuses on the Seven Sacred Teachings, which call for us to take responsibility both for how we treat each other and how we live

TAXES

Alberta is the only province in Canada with no Provincial Sales Tax (PST), However, Alherta charges a 4% Tourism Levy on hotel rooms. The Canadian Government charges. a 5% Goods & Services Tax (GST) on most purchases. In Saskatchewan there is a separate 10% liquor consumption tax. The non-alcoholic portion of a restaurant meal is not taxed.

CONSTRUCTION / EMERGENCY SPEED LIMIT

Motorists must slow to 60 kph, or less if the posted speed is lower, when passing stopped emergency vehicles (police, ambulance, fire-fighting, public utility, or designated emergency response vehicle) or tow trucks on the same side of the highway with their flashing lights on.

DISTRACTED DRIVING LAWS

Canada has strict laws against distracted driving. Drivers can be charged with this offense and heavily fined if they operate any electronic device such as a cell phone, or are caught eating or grooming while driving. It is also an offense to drive in a way that will distract, startle, or interfere with highway users.

FERRY SERVICES

B.C. Ferries serves almost 50 points of call along the B.C. coastline. For information on fares, routes and times, or to make reservations call 1-888 BC FERRY (toll free in North America) or visit beferries.com

DOES MY PET NEED A PERMIT?

Many live animals require permits. Often animals require a health inspection in the country of origin. A domestic dog or cat travelling with the owner need only meet the rabies certification requirements.

TIPPING

The average tip in Canada is 20 percent. However, depending on the level and the nature of the service, tipping may range from 10 to more than 20 percent. Tips are generally given for good service by food and beverage servers in bars and restaurants, taxi drivers, tour guides, hotel bellhops, and estheticians. While it is not required to tip other service staff, you are certainly at liberty to do so.

RENTING A CAR

All car rental companies have a strong network of outlets across Canada. To rent a car you must be 21 years old and hold a valid driver's licence and a major credit card. (A surcharge may apply to drivers under 25 vears of age.)

RENTING A MOTORHOME

Renting a motorhome is a convenient way to explore the Yellowhead Highway. You may purchase insurance at the time of rental. For lower rates, it is recommended that bookings be made three to four months in advance

NATIONAL PARK ENTRY

Permits are required for entry into any national park in Canada.
